Full of Holiday Cheer: Using Prepositions in a Sentence

Directions for the teacher:

STEP 1 – Use Task A as a warm up activity. Then highlight the grammar of the questions. Note how prepositional phrases either act as adjectives (describing or identifying a noun) or adverbs (explaining when, where, how or why something is done).

- 1. What holidays are **celebrated** in December? [like an adverb]
- 2. Do you know any games or foods associated with December holidays? [like an adverb]
- 3. Is giving holiday gifts a **tradition** in your family? [like an adjective]

STEP 2 – Students will complete Task B alone or in pairs. Correct their answers as a class.

Answers:

- 1. Omisoka, the last day of December, is a holiday in Japan.
- 2. Otoshidama is the Japanese tradition of giving money to children on New Year's Day.

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- 3. Mistletoe is a plant that is **hung** over a doorway in many American homes.
- 4. It's a tradition for people to kiss under a piece of mistletoe.

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- 10. A Christmas tree is **decorated** with colorful ornaments and lights.
- 11. It's a tradition to place presents under the Christmas tree.
- 12. Some people exchange presents on New Year's Eve.
- 13. Hanukkah is celebrated in November or December.
- 14. People in the U.K. and Ireland celebrate Boxing Day on December 26.
- 15. Leftovers from Christmas Day can be eaten on Boxing Day.

STEP 3 – In Tasks C and D, students will write a short paragraph based on partner interviews. Final drafts can be submitted to you. Optional: Partners can read each other's work, underlining prepositional phrases and circling the words being modified.
